History of the Pacific Coast Norwegian Singers Association.

The **Pacific Kystens** Norske Sangerforbund (Pacific Coast Norwegian Singers Association) was first organized in Seattle, August 26, 1902 at a concert and banquet given by Nordmendenes Sangforening of Seattle. An invitation had been extended earlier the five to Norwegian

a capella male choruses on the coast to send representatives for the purpose of organizing an association. Their goal was thereby to transplant the idea of annual sangerfests from Norway to the west coast.

Representatives were present from choruses in Portland (headed by Fredrik A. Tomte who first proposed the plan), Tacoma, Seattle, Ballard and Everett. John Norman of Everett was elected president; A. J. Thuland, Seattle, secretary (he later resigned and Julius Sunde, Seattle, was named to fill the vacancy); Dr. A. O. Loe, Seattle, treasurer; and Carlo A. Sperati, Tacoma, musical director. The first Sangerfest was held in Everett, August 1-3, 1903.

After two months of training he hired on as a sailing instructor for a cruise to South America, on which half the crew were from Navy. the Unfortunately, that cruise was cancelled. While the ship was anchored in Oslo, the US training ship Eagle arrived in the harbor and the crew of that ship was invited over to the Christian Radich for a tour.

It was the Air Force that needed more mechanics and weaponry people, and Kris spend two years at the Air Force mechanic school in Kjevik, Norway, plus some special training at Erding Air Force base in Germany, and then served three years as an aircraft mechanic before emigrating to the U.S.

He ended up in Minneapolis, where he worked in the Northwest Airlines engine shop at Holman Field. After that he worked in the computer field, which was picking up speed at the time. In the Glee Club Kris has served as Marshal, Financial Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Vice-President and President, and is presently Chairman of the Music Committee. While living in California for five years, he sang with the Normanna Male Chorus in Oakland and attended Sangerfests in Tacoma and Seattle.

For several yars Kris handled the mailings and tickets for our lutefisk dinners, no small task, and one he has now passed on to Earl Evanstad. Kris is in his 48th year with the Glee Club. He with several other long-time members have been so vital to the continuation of the existence and the traditions of this ninety-seven year old organization.

NORDIC MALE CHORUS

Sioux City IA

With the Nordic Male Chorus in summer hiatus, it provides the opportunity to add a historical footnote to the 118-year history of our singing group.

From the files of the Norwegian American Historical Association (NAHA), an article by Odd-Stein Granhus relates the story of Emil Lauritz Ludvigson Mengshoel, a famed political journalist of his era.

In his treatise Granhus writes that Mengshoel was a very early "Nordic Chorus" member of the parent organization, Normendenes Sangforening, organized in 1891. Invited by his half-sister, Mengshoel came to America from Norway in 1891 and, after a few months employment in Alabama, arrived in Sioux City the Spring of 1892.

He soon participated in the cultural life of Sioux City as a very active member of the male chorus. He claimed he "had a passable baritone voice." Mengshoel wrote articles for the Sioux City Norwegian newspaper *Tidende* (Tidings) and in 1894 became a member of the newspaper staff. He developed friendly relations with the editor, John Store (Story), who was also "song instructor" for the Chorus.

Mengshoel was elected to the Chorus' "Accounts Committee" and wrote a song, "Sangerfest Kantate" (Song Festival Cantata), which the choruses sang at the National Sangerfest that the Sioux City chorus hosted on June 30, 1894.

The newsman moved to Minneapolis in 1896, where he published two radical Socialist newspapers *Gaa paa/Folkets Rost*

(Onward/Voice of the People) from 1903 to 1925.

Norwegian-Americans were renowned for the great number of newspapers they published in America with a total of more than 400 titles.

Before his death in 1945 the well-known – in his time – dissident editor wrote two novels, many stories, dramatic sketches and about 40 poems.

NSAA BOARD MEETING MINUTES

The Executive Board of the Norwegian Singers Association of America held a meeting at the Concourse Hotel, Madison WI on Friday, June 26, 2009. Present were President Jon Lewis, Treasurer Francis Peterson, Corresponding Donald Berg, Secretary President at Large Thor Fiell, Marshal Gary Hendrickson, Director-in Chief David Judisch, and Assistant Director Ed Kramer. Also present were MN Vice-President Kristen Rusten, WI Vice President Charles Morkri, Herb Nelson (Pres., Norwegian Glee Club of Minneapolis), and Jim Pettersen and Steve Christianson of the Edvard Grieg Chorus, which hosted the meeting.

A brief tour of the hotel's facilities was given prior to the meeting.

The meeting was called to order by Lewis at 11:15 a.m.

Treasurer Peterson gave a report, including the article he authored for the May-June issue of *Sanger-Hilsen* about the Sangerfest at Fargo in 2008. He then distributed an interim report of NSAA and *Sanger-Hilsen* finances, and recommended that we keep the status quo on subscription rates and Christmas greetings.

Lewis then gave a Sangerfest 2010 update. He began with his goals based on the 2008 Sangerfest, that there be better acoustics and seating for the singers. He gave a verbal description of Madison's facilities, which we later toured: Overture Center, Overture Hall, Capital Theater and Promenade Hall.

Lewis spoke further about costs and the goal of keeping registration fees down by seeking other funding, such as gifts and grants. Wisconsin Public Television may video the concert(s) and a DVD will be available. The host chorus is budgeting for audiences of 1000, but anticipate selling more tickets. Several major items are already contracted. There will be no extra costs for meeting rooms; parking of \$7/day is included in the \$134/day hotel rate.

Berg described his working arrangement on *Sanger-Hilsen* with Dennis Barnaal, who serves as technical assistant and/or co-editor. MSC (Morkri/Kramer) to make this matter an agenda item for the 2010 NSAA business meeting.

Lewis noted various parts of the NSAA Constitution need updating and/or revision. Berg agreed to reprint the Constitution in its current form and invite comments and proposed changes which would then be printed prior to the 2010 Sangerfest.

The next agenda item was the 501(c)(3) status of NSAA and the various member choruses. Bjornson, Normennenes, Luren, Norwegian Glee Club of Minneapolis, Nordkap, and Edvard Grieg Chorus are known to have such IRS status. The Board recommends that other choruses investigate gaining such status.

The question was raised whether procedures for receiving gifts, grants, bequests, etc. should be incorporated into the revised Constitution. It was noted that any organization can come to the NSAA to expedite receiving of funds with the proper documentation. Records need to be kept of how such funds are spent. A form used by the Edvard Grieg Chorus could easily be adapted for this purpose.

NSAA needs to decide whether to serve as fiscal receiver for other groups/choruses and, if so, to make provision for verification. Such can be as basic as a simple letter notifying the receiver group of the IRS requirements and having said group later send NSAA such a letter of verification, indicating how the funds were used.

Following a meal provided by the Edvard Grieg Chorus, we were treated to a tour of the various venues to be used for Sangerfest in 2010. Respectfully submitted,

Later this summer we are scheduled to sing at the Dean House in Monona, a suburb of Madison. Looking ahead to the fall, it appears that several performance opportunities are already on the schedule. We are also looking forward to beginning our rehearsal of the songs that will be on the Sangerfest 2010 program.

Continued History of the PCNSA

The Second Sangerfest was held July 30-31, August 1, 1904 in Seattle with 160 active singers taking part. At that time the Parkland Singing Society, the San Francisco Singing Society and choruses from Silvana and Barlow, WA, joined the group.

Five additional singing groups became members of the association at the third annual Sangerfest held in Portland, OR, August 26-28, 1905, during the Lewis and Clark Exposition. Three hundred singers took part and were given an excellent opportunity for presenting Norwegian to one of music the most representative audiences ever assembled west of the Rockies.

In 1909 some 275 singers took part in the two concerts of the Sixth Annual Sangerfest in Seattle during the Alaska-Yukon Pacific Exposition, with soloists from abroad. Over 40,000 attended the fair on Norway Day and the concerts were given outdoors.

The 1910 Sangerfest was distinguished by the fact that it was held in Eureka, CA, the only city on the west coast where steamboat was the only means of access. There were no trains and no buses. With few exceptions, Sangergests have been held annually ever since.

During its history, the organization has had several directors-in-chief. Carlo A. Sperati, Rudolph Møller, George S. Johnson, Monrad Malmim, August Werner, Henry Ringman, Gunnar J. Malmin, Dr. Alf L. Knudsen, Ed Amundson, Dr. Jon Malmin, Peter Butler and Steve Jensen have all taken their turns at the podium.

There have been several other Sangerfests of special interest: at Seattle in 1951 where 5200 heard the concert in the open air Aqua Theatre (to page 16)

with Lauritz Melchior as soloist; in San Francisco during the Norway-Panama-Pacific Exposition in 1915; a trip to Norway in 1926 with a chorus of 48 selected singers under the direction of Rudolph Møller; at the Golden Gate International Exposition on Treasure Island in San Francisco, in 1939; during the Washington State Centennial year at Tacoma in 1953; a National Sangerfest in Sioux Falls, SD in 1992; our 100th Anniversary Sangerfest in Everett in 2002; and now our 100th Sangerfest in Eugene, OR in 2009.

Nine groups were affiliated with the PCNSA in 1959. At one time there were affiliated choruses in Ketchikan, another in Idaho and three in Montana. Now we count twelve member groups: Bellingham, Everett, Skagit Valley, Seattle, Poulsbo and Tacoma in Washington, Salem and Eugene in Oregon, Sacramento, Oakland, San Francisco and San Diego in California.
