NORDIC MALE CHORUS Sioux City, IA

The chorus has completed its move to a new location in Sioux City following the sale of its longtime rehearsal setting in the Scandinavian Societies Hall on Fourth Street.

The chorus, as well as the Sons of Norway and Swedish Vasa, have completed an agreement to hold their meetings at Immanuel Lutheran Church, 315 Hamilton Boulevard with sessions in the church hall.

Several truck loads of equipment, music and files, chairs, tables and piano were transported to the church in December for the opening of chorus practices in the new year, beginning January 19. An auction was held January 17 for items not moved to the church.

Director Charles Schuett said that the focus of rehearsals will be for participation in the Sioux Valley Sangerfest June 13 in Sioux Falls, SD, hosted by the Norse Glee Club. Music selected for the Sangerfest will be reviewed, with joint rehearsals in the several months leading up to the event. The Sioux Valley organization consists of the Nordic and Norse Glee groups, as well as the Minnehaha Mandskor of Sioux Falls and the Grieg Male Chorus of Canton, SD.

This issue we feature another of our "Diamonds", Einar Johansen, a Glee Club member for 55 years. Einar's story begins in Gudbrandsdalen, Norway in 1928 where he spent his youth. After WWII Einar learned his trade working with Master Furniture Maker, Karl Nilsen, in Oslo. In 1949, before coming to America, he had to serve for one year in the 49 Occupation Brigade in Germany. after arriving Two days Minneapolis in 1951, he became an employee of the Joseph Palen Fixture Company. That summer he met Chris Feste who was a foreman for home builder Andrew Wangstad and went to work with him. Chris and Andrew were members of the Glee Club and Einar was encouraged to join, and he

An interruption occurred in 1955 when he was drafted into the US Army, serving two years with the Corps of Engineers attached to the Air Force serving in Germany and France.

Returning to Minneapolis in 1957, Einar set up his own business doing remodeling and cabinet work. At this time he also met a lovely girl from Valdres, Norway. A three-day old-fashioned Norwegian wedding followed. Sadly, Randi died three months before their 45th anniversary. Two fine daughters and two grandchildren are some of the legacy of Randi's life.

Starting in the 60's and for 20 years, Einar was selling and installing commercial and hobby greenhouses in the Dakotas. Minnesota. Wisconsin. This kept him away from home a good share of the time. Since retiring from that endeavor, he has been spending his time in his wood working shop, building custom cabinets and furniture. He also has a closet full of old violins waiting to be repaired, so he will never run out of projects. He says, "At present I am busy trying to accomplish as little as possible." (He has earned that.)

An interesting recollection: On a Sunday in 1947 Einar was strolling along Oslo's harbor docks when the MS Stavangerfjord from New York was tying up at the Norwegian American Line pier. On an upper deck a group of men were lined up and singing the national anthems. It was the Norwegian Glee Club of Minneapolis coming to Norway on a concert tour. At that time it was not in Einar's plans that he would be singing with them six years later.



The Overture Center incorporates three architectural elements that date back to the 1920s. The Capitol Theater originally opened in 1928 as an opulent, 2.500-seat silent-film era movie theater. (Twice renovated, the Capitol Theater will be the site of the Parade of Choruses.) In 1972, the City of Madison purchased the theater to serve as the home for the Madison Civic Center. Following its expansion and renovation, the Civic Center opened in 1980 and flourished as an arts presenter and home to local arts groups. By the mid-1990's, however, success the of the resident organizations outgrew the existing facility's capacities.

Then in 1998 local philanthropist Jerry Frautschi astonished Madison with a gift of \$50 million for a new arts facility. Overture Center for the Arts was completed in 2006 with a final price tag of \$205 million, entirely funded by Mr. Frautschi and his wife Pleasant Rowland, founder of American Girl Company. the Designed by architect Cesar Pelli, the Overture Center's facilities include three performance venues, four art galleries, and the Madison Museum of Contemporary Art, with its rooftop restaurant and sculpture garden. The Grand Concert will be held in the new Overture Hall. A detailed description of Overture Hall will be provided in the next edition of Sanger-Hilsen.

LUREN HISTORY (Continued from Sept-Oct '08)

The Luren Singing Society, which had reorganized on March 17,1974,

went right to work on rehearsals twice each week, and began giving programs for invited audiences, mostly in Decorah, by the following fall. On Thursday, Nov. 26, 1974, the first public concert was given in Calmar, 10 miles from Decorah, at Radliff's Hall. The entire program was printed in the Saturday, Nov. 21 issue of Decorah Posten as preconcert publicity. We can only presume that posters were used as well as word-of-mouth advertising. No composers' names were listed. The program was:

The 8 p.m. concert was followed by a dance that probably lasted into Sunday morning.

Emil Berg, an employee of *Decorah Posten*, directed the chorus and sang the three solos. (No mention is made of an accompanist.) He had come from LaCrosse, where he had directed the male Normanna Sangkor since its start in 1869. B. Anundsen, owner and publisher of *Decorah Posten*, generously promoted the young organization in its columns. He even served as one of the early

officers, both as vice president and president.

For a fairly long time, the paper also carried as a feature Scandinavian music that could be taken from the paper and eventually bound into a song book. Both music and words were included.

A month later, on Monday, Dec. 28, Luren sang its first public concert in Decorah at the relatively new Steyer's Opera House. (See the May-June 2006 issue of *Sanger-Hilsen* for an extensive article about that building.) Even though this concert took place early in the Christmas season, there was little, if any, emphasis on Christmas music.

That Luren intended to be around for a while is evidenced by a plan by the wives of the chorus members to prepare a banner in time to be used for the celebration of *Syttende Mai* 1875.

This first unofficial Luren Auxiliary sewed the substantial banner, beginning in February. The musical symbols still in use on the current banner were evident, as was the Luren motto I sang vi forenet staa (In song we stand united). The materials cost over \$100. How many hours of skilled seamstress labor were contributed in support of their husbands' musical dreams and goals!

The banner was formally presented to Luren by the ladies on Thursday April 28, 1875. After some speeches the singers encircled the banner and sang "Til Damerne" which was written for the occasion by Bernt Askevold. The Decorah Posten noted "After the ceremonies were over, they amused themselves in the best manner until well into the night."

ABOUT THE COVER PICTURE.

This undated picture, probably from some years after 1875, indicates that Luren was more than a singing group. At various times on the programs there were vaudeville acts and other kinds of entertainment.

The caption *Skurrekvartten i Luren* can be freely translated as "The Washboard Quartet." The verb *skure* means to rub, scrub, or scour, while the noun form means cleaning. Another verb, *skurre*, means to grate or jar the ears. Either term would probably fit the nature of this group.

Note that the four members are all in costume, playing their home-made cigar box "instruments." The bass instrument is made from an Ivory Soap box. Was their music 99 and 44/100 percent pure, or was it purely farce? It is interesting to note that the original picture had been lightly color tinted. (continued in a future issue)
