Thorleif and Hallgerd were dedicated members of the Sons of Norway lodges, and he was a proud member of the Norse Glee Club. He often spoke most fondly of his Glee Club memories.

In his obituary a family member offered thisô õTHORLEIF was a big man with a big heart. He charmed people with his Norwegian brogue and ready humor and had friends wherever he went. He treasured and shared his Norwegian heritage but was also very proud of being a US citizen.ö

LeRoy C. Iverson was born 2 Aug. 1929 at Spring Grove MN, one of four children of Arlo and Clara (Skorgen) Iverson. He grew up on the family farm near Newburg, attended the Newburg rural school and Mabel MN high school, graduating in 1947. After business college in Winona MN, he served in the U.S. Air Force from 1951-1954, and graduated from the University of Minnesota in 1958 with a BS degree in Dairy Science.

He worked for the USDA dairy division in Minnesota, Wisconsin, Illinois, and Syracuse NY, retiring in 1994 to Decorah. Leroy married Jean Lenore Lovdokken 24 Feb. 1962 in Edina MN. They became parents of LeRoy sang in many three sons. church choirs, most recently in Decorah Lutheran Church. became a reliable member of Luren singing Singers, second participating in tours and NSAA Sangerfests, and serving as president.

He served in several positions of the Decorah Sons of Norway, and volunteered at Vesterheim Museum in Decorah. LeRoy enjoyed wood working, making a number of craft items.

LeRoy died July 13 in Decorah. He was preceded by his parents, two sisters, and one brother. Surviving are his wife Jean; three sons, Erik, Paul, and David.

The funeral service was held at Decorah Lutheran Church on July 21,

and the Luren Singers sang Crusader & Hymn, We Shall Walk through the Valley, and *Aftensong*. Roger Buhr, fellow singer in Church Choir and in Luren, gave a fitting comprehensive tribute.

The event has been growing each vear and is an opportunity for Normennenes to recruit members, and invite new singers to join our chorus.

As we look ahead to our 148th Anniversary we are reminded that Normennenes has a long history in Chicago. In a book entitled *A History of the Norwegians of Illinois*, published in 1905 by the John Anderson Publishing Company of Chicago, there is a three page section

outlining Normennenes' early history as one of the prominent Norwegian social and cultural organizations in Chicago. The section begins with the Normaendenes words õThe Sangforening was organized on October 30, 1870.ö The book divulges specifics about concerts, venues and parades, and other fascinating details of late 19th Century Norwegian Chicago's community. For instance, our chorus serenaded Bjørnstjerne Bjørnson at his hotel in 1880, õwhich won for them some warm words of appreciation from the Norwegian poet and author when he visited the city.ö And, in 1887 the chorus attended a Sangerfest of the United Scandinavian Singers of America, in Philadelphia. It was othe first which had been held by the Scandinavians in this country.ö

We keep our Society's history in mind as we look ahead to celebrating another year as Normennenes Singing Society, and toward our 150th year!

Pacific Coast Norwegian Singers Association Sangerfest 2018

Pacific Coast The Norwegian Association Singers held 109thannual Sangerfest in Poulsbo, Washington on June 21-23, 2018. The event was hosted by the Executive Board of the PCNSA at the Casino/Resort Clearwater Suquamish, Washington and near the City of Poulsbo. Poulsbo, known as The Viking City, is a community of 10,500 located on Liberty Bay, across Puget Sound from Seattle. Prior to the arrival of Scandinavian settlers in the 1880s, Poulsbo was in the heartland of the Suquamish People.

Over three days, 93 singers from 9 choruses, along with family members and friends, renewed friendships, enjoyed performances by individual choruses, socialized over luncheons and dinners, participated in the annual

business meeting, and attended the Grand Concert of the combined choruses. The Ladies Luncheon featured a Suquamish Tribal Elder and storyteller, who shared the Suquamish story of creation.

The Grand Concert, presented at the Clearwater, included 15 choral selections and was directed by Director-in-Chief Erik Eliason and Assistant Director-in-Chief Katherine Dr. Jeff Highland provided piano accompaniment. Special entertainment was provided by the duo performers, Tania Opland and Mike Freeman. Familiar to the residents in the area, they have toured together for over 20 years. Both are versatile musicians. For our Sangerfest concert, Tania performed on hammered dulcimer, guitar, violin, phonofiddle, recorder, and also sang, accompanied by Mike on the guitar.
